#### City Manager's Office Welcomes Christopher W. Boyd and Melanie Randel!

Please join us in welcoming Christopher W. Boyd and Melanie Randel to the City Manager's Office! The City Council appointed Christopher W. Boyd as City Manager, effective October 1. After serving as the Chief's Executive Assistant for 7 ½ years, Melanie Randel has also joined the City Manager's team as the City Manager's Executive Assistant. Working closely with Assistant to the City Manager Monica Alejandrez, Randel will support the City Manager's Office and City Council; supervise staff; play a large role in community relations, communications, and events; and serve as a resource to all City Hall staff.

The City of Citrus Heights was incorporated in 1997 and former City Manager Henry Tingle was appointed the City's first full-time City Manager in 1999. Best known for his strong fiscal responsibility, Tingle announced in January that he would be retiring effective September 30, 2016, after 18 years of service for the City of Citrus Heights. In 2005, Tingle hired Boyd as the city's

first chief of police, tasking him with creating a new police department. Boyd did so within ten months and under budget, replacing the sheriff's department, which had been the contract policing agency for the first nine years of cityhood. Since then, the Citrus Heights Police Department has become known for its creative approach to community policing, employee leadership development, focus on youth, and innovative programs that have consistently reduced crime every year.

Boyd has earned the respect and support of the citizens of Citrus Heights and his relationships within the community are strong, therefore transitioning to the role of city manager will be seamless. "It has been an honor to serve the City of Citrus Heights as chief of police. I have come to really know and love this community over these last ten years," he said. "I am equally honored and excited to now have the opportunity to serve as city manager." Citrus Heights Mayor Jeannie Bruins commented, "Chris is already well versed on the issues facing Citrus Heights; he understands the community and local challenges. His experience affords him a vantage point many city managers do not have. We really couldn't ask for a more ideal candidate and we look forward with great anticipation to working with Chris in his new capacity. We are confident the City of Citrus Heights will continue to be in very good hands."

In addition, the newly-appointed City Manager has served on numerous boards, associations, and commissions throughout his career, most notably the California Police Chiefs Association of which he was the president in 2014. A tenured, accomplished executive, Boyd possesses broad, cross-functional experience in a variety of disciplines such as strategic-planning, system implementations, and business operations. He is a recipient of the prestigious Barbara Hammerman Award for distinguished leadership.

Boyd, 50, holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice and Sociology from the University of Idaho, and a Master of Public Administration degree from the College of Notre Dame. He is a graduate of California's Supervisory Leadership Institute, the 197th session of the National FBI Academy, and the 62nd session of the Executive Development Seminar through the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He lives locally with his wife and two young sons.

#### Ron Lawrence Begins Tenure as Second Citrus Heights Chief of Police

Chief Ron Lawrence began his tenure as Citrus Heights' second Chief of Police on October 31.

The City will host a reception and formal swearing-in ceremony for Chief Lawrence on Thursday, November 10 at City Hall. The reception will take place from 6-7 PM in the foyer and the swearing-in will occur at 7 PM in the Council Chambers. The public is welcome to attend and meet Chief Ron Lawrence.

Chief Lawrence has served the City of Rocklin as its Chief of Police for the last five years. "I have tremendous respect for Chief Lawrence as a law enforcement executive and know his high standards in leadership, community service, and public safety will well lead the Citrus Heights Police Department into its next chapter," commented Boyd. "Twenty-seven years of law enforcement experience in the Sacramento and

Bay Area regions have earned him an excellent reputation with law enforcement professionals industrywide and in the agencies and communities he has served. His empathy and compassion are values of utmost importance in today's policing."

Chief Lawrence grew up on a rice farm in Sutter County, California attending the police academy in 1989. He was appointed Chief of Police for the City of Rocklin on April 1, 2011, after promoting through the ranks with a variety of law enforcement agencies throughout Northern California. Prior to his appointment in Rocklin, he served there as a captain. As well, over the course of his career, he served as a lieutenant with Palo Alto PD, a sergeant and police officer with West Sacramento PD, an officer with Lincoln PD, and a deputy sheriff with both the Placer County and Sacramento County Sheriff's Departments.

Chief Lawrence has held numerous assignments throughout his career including as a court bailiff, jail deputy, patrol officer, field training officer, motorcycle traffic officer, internal affairs investigator, personnel and training coordinator, watch commander, division commander, and in undercover street-crimes/vice – to name a few

Chief Lawrence currently serves as 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President on the Executive Board of Directors for the California Police Chiefs' Association and is active on many other boards and commissions. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia and of the California POST Command College for law enforcement executives. He is also an Adjunct Professor with William Jessup University and holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice from the Union Institute and University and a Master of Arts Degree in Leadership from Saint Mary's College. He lives in Rocklin with his wife Jennifer, their children, and two golden retrievers.


#### City Leaders Establish New Six-Month Objectives at Strategic Planning Retreat

#### A Community for Peace Honors Citrus Heights with 2016 Champion of Hope Award

At the annual Celebration of Hope event on Friday, October 14, A Community for Peace recognized the City of Citrus Heights with the prestigious 2016 Champion of Hope Award.

According to Executive Director Elaine M. Whitefeather, the annual award is intended to "honor and recognize various members of our community and county at large who have been instrumental in creating, inspiring supporting or sustaining hope for victims, survivors and families living in the abuse and trauma of domestic violence and family violence."

Mayor Bruins, Vice Mayor Slowey, Council Member Miller, Council Member Turner, and Council Member Frost accepted the award on behalf of the City. For the past 8 years, the City has partnered with A Community for Peace, developing innovative programs to provide resources and support to those affected by domestic violence.

One such program is the one-of-a-kind Domestic Violence Response Team (DVRT). The DVRT Program allows volunteer advocates to ride along with Citrus Heights Police Department officers as they respond to calls. Advocates provide onsite counseling support to women, children, and men who may experience domestic abuse. In addition, the City partnered with the group to provide an emergency shelter for those escaping domestic abuse in Citrus Heights.

Whitefeather thanked the City "for planting such strong seeds of peace; for creating fertile ground for these seeds to grow, and for the partnership you have given us to nurture our growth and ability to serve all of those who seek us in Citrus Heights and throughout Sacramento County."

The City of Citrus Heights 8th Annual Holiday Referral Program is coming soon! The Citrus Heights Police Department and the City of Citrus Heights are again partnering with various local service clubs, schools, neighborhoods, businesses, and community members to brighten the holidays for several of our Citrus Heights families. This collaborative effort between all facets of the community specifically targets assistance to families residing in the City of Citrus Heights. Last year we worked with over 50 service clubs, business groups, social clubs, churches, schools, and community members to assist over 50 families, including 157 children and 120 adults.

This unique community-involved program was created to help families who have experienced a hardship or critical event in their life over the past year that has caused a significant change in their financial abilities. The program provides participating families with food, household items, and toys/clothes for the children. We rely heavily on the community to help make the effort a success. Participation can include the donation of items, adopting a family, volunteering, or all of the above. Community members can donate or nominate a family who needs assistance by filling out a referral form. To refer a family for consideration, an application must be completed and submitted to CHPD. The "Holiday Referral Program Application" can be picked up at the front counter of CHPD or found online at www.citrusheightspd.net. Completed referral applications can either be dropped off at the department or mailed to CHPD at 6315 Fountain Square Drive, Citrus Heights, California, 95621. Applications will be accepted from Tuesday, November 1, 2016 thru Sunday, November 20, 2016.

We will begin accepting donations from Monday, November 21st to Monday, December 19, 2016. Donations can be dropped off at the Citrus Heights Police Department located at 6315 Fountain Square Drive between the hours of 9:00A.M. - 5:00P.M., Monday through Friday, or Saturdays between 9:00 A.M. - 2:00 P.M.



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# History and Arts

On October 20th the History & Arts Commission held its Ladies to the Rescue movie premiere. The film highlights the Citrus Heights Ladies Auxiliary and Ladies in White by incorporating oral history interviews from former Ladies in White and local historians with historical photos. Commissioner Larry Fritz has worked with Webinet media for the past year in order to make this documentary a possibility. The movie premiere was well attended with over 150 people gathering to celebrate at the Community Center. Volunteer archivist, Teena Stern, introduced the film and provided the audience with the historical background of the Ladies Auxiliary and Ladies in White. Commissioner Fritz's documentary depicted the heroic tales of these Ladies. Formed during the Second

World War, the Ladies Auxiliary was an all-female volunteer firefighting organization which later inspired the establishment of the Ladies in White in 1951 to respond to first aid emergencies in Citrus Heights. From delivering babies to putting out fires, Ladies to the Rescue, honors the devotion and contribution the Ladies Auxiliary and Ladies in White made to Citrus Heights history.

### Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

### Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

#### Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

### **Eligibility Requirements**

- The applicant <u>must not</u> have owned a home as a principal place of residence within the past (3) complete years.
- The property must be located within the city of Citrus Heights. The property may be a singlefamily dwelling or condominium unit. Multi-unit structures and mobilehomes are <u>not</u> eligible.
- The applicant must meet the low-income household requirements.
- Income Limits table in the column to the right.
   The current maximum income is calculated by applicant family size.
