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Creek Corridor Trail Project Update - The Creek Corridor Trail Project team is currently working on the Existing Conditions and Opportunities and Constraints Analysis for the City's Creek and SMUD Utility Corridor. This effort includes examining over 80 discreet segments that comprise Cripple, Arcade, and Brooktree Creeks and the SMUD utility corridor that connects Citrus Heights and Orangevale.

Each segment has gone through a preliminary analysis of feasibility and has been given a relative rating that indicates its priority for further study. Each of these segments has its own characteristics that will affect the feasibility of trail construction. Each segment was scored based on ownership, natural resources, corridor width, and topography. By examining ownership, natural resources, corridor width, and topography for each segment we are developing an understanding about which segments have the best potential for accommodating a trail. This is primarily a relative analysis of where it may be physically possible to build trails. The relative scoring of each segment has been mapped and is available here: <u>http://www.citrusheights.net/home/index.asp?page=1575</u>.

The map depicts various segments that warrant further study to determine feasibility of trail construction based on the corridor characteristics. The map does not represent any final decision about where trails will eventually be built. It is a tool that we are using to help focus additional analysis and examination. Additional outreach, evaluation, and consideration will be ongoing through February 2014.

It is important for the project team to hear from the community so that we can understand their concerns and so we have a project that is responsive to community concerns. Animal Services-World Rabies Day is scheduled for Saturday, September 28th. Participating residents will be able to receive a free rabies vaccination, low or no-cost microchip and free first-time license for pet dogs and/or cats. Safe Routes to School-Walkability-Bikeability Project – Staff is working with local schools to schedule community meetings to review recommendations from the Walkability/Bikeability Safe Routes to School draft Master Plan and obtain final community input. The community meetings will be held in August and September 2013.

Stock Ranch Nature Preserve – Bids were opened on July 16th. On August 8th, staff will recommend that Council award a contract to McGuire Pacific. Work will begin in September, and the project is expected to take 120 days to be completed. Following completion of the first phase of this project, the Sacramento Tree Foundation will mobilize and begin the replanting of native oaks in an area of the project designed to reforest the area with native species of oak trees. This portion of the project is fully funded through the Sacramento Tree Foundation using available oak tree/native tree mitigation funds. Their commitment to the replant-

The City of Citrus Heights has recently received an application for a project which would result in changes to the current City Hall grounds.

The proposed project would alter the current configuration of buildings on the civic center campus. Of the existing buildings, only the Police Department would remain. The existing City Hall building would be demolished and a new City Hall would be built just to the north of the current location. All of the other buildings on the civic center campus, except for the Police Department building, would also be removed and a new, three-story medical office building with parking would be constructed near the corner of Greenback Lane and Fountain Square Drive. A new parking lot would be built to the north of the Police Department.

The City will be hosting a community meeting on Thursday, August 15th at 6:30 PM in the City Hall Council Chambers (7117 Greenback Lane). Project plans will be available for viewing. The community meeting will begin with a brief presentation about the project. Following the presentation, City staff and the developer for the medical office building will be available for questions.





Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

Eligibility Requirements

- The applicant <u>must not</u> have owned a home as a principal place of residence within the past (3) complete years.
- The property must be located within the city of Citrus Heights. The property may be a singlefamily dwelling or condominium unit. Multi-unit structures and mobilehomes are <u>not</u> eligible.
- The applicant must meet the low-income household requirements.
- Income Limits table in the column to the right. The current maximum income is calculated by applicant family size.

Fair housing is a term that encompasses federal and state laws designed to ensure equal opportunity for all Americans purchasing or renting a home. The law protects tenants from illegal discrimination and harassment in housing based on the following protected classes:

- Color

- Gender
- National Origin
- Familial Status
- Disability
- Age
- Marital Status
- Sexual Orientation
- Ancestry
- Source of Income
- Gender Identity
- Personal Characteristic

SIGNS OF HEATSTROKE

Muddy pink gums (instead of bright pink), heavy panting with occasional frothing at the mouth, disorientation, increased heart rate.

What To Do: Remove the pet from the heat source if possible. Increase ventilation (fan) and apply cool water or a cool towel compress. Do not apply ice, this causes the blood vessels to constrict and takes the dog longer to cool down. Reapply the cool towels frequently. Offer water to your pet, but don't force it. Get your pet to the veterinarian quickly.
