

Did You Know that Used Motor Oil Never Wears Out?

It just gets dirty. But oil can be recycled, cleaned, and used again. Recycling used motor oil conserves a natural resource (oil) and is good for the environment. Motor oil poured onto the ground or into storm drains, or tossed into trash cans (even in a sealed container) can contaminate and pollute the soil, groundwater, streams, and rivers (and it's illegal!). Recycling your used motor oil reduces this pollution threat. When you take your used oil to a certified center for recycling, you are protecting the environment, conserving a valuable resource, and getting

paid for it! Please recycle your used motor oil.

Used motor oil can be placed in a jug and sealed and then put on the curb next to your recycling cart on recycling week. Used oil filters can also be recycled, drain the used oil filter of any oil and place it in a sealable plastic bag, such as a Ziploc bag. The sealed bag with the filter can then be placed or taped to your used oil jug. Don't have a jug? Contact Republic Services at (916)725-9060 and they will deliver one out to you! Citrus Heights makes it easy to recycle your used oil and oil filters!





Animals Services Division

Did you know the City of Citrus Heights just celebrated the 2nd Anniversary for the Animal Services Division? While the City still contracts for shelter services with Sacramento County, the City has had two outstanding Animal Services Officers of its own. Whether attending events, neighborhood meetings, rescuing baby ducks, kittens or Chihuahuas from storm drains, catching loose dogs or rolling their truck window down to tell someone 'get a leash!' – ASO Ruben Hernandez and ASO Tanya Shareef have served Citrus Heights for the past two years, contributing their expertise to the development of the Animal Services program.



MEET YOUR ASO's!

Ruben Hernandez came to Citrus Heights with 13 years experience as an Animal Control Officer at Sacramento Animal Care and Regulation and has worked for the City of Citrus Heights for 2 years. Ruben contributes greatly to the process and procedures as Citrus Heights transitioned its services from the County program to its own program. Ruben oversees administrative hearings for the City, helping settle disputes and assure public safety is maintained. When he is not helping us build the structure of our program, Ruben is a huge San Francisco 49er's fan and always knows the SCORE! Ruben coaches his son's football programs, and enjoys barbecuing and all types of fishing. Ruben has one cat and three dogs of his own, including a REALLY BIG DOG, Chloe – a Caucasian Mountain Shepherd, that can reach sizes of 121 - 187 pounds, and between 25 - 33 inches at the shoulder!

Tanya Shareef is a Registered Vet Tech (RVT) and has previously worked for the City of Oakland, the Marin Humane Society, the Santa Clara County Humane Society and volunteered as an Animal Control officer for the Ripon community. Tanya actively develops relationships with the cat community of Citrus Heights. You might think you are seeing double if you travel through Citrus Heights, because Tanya seems to be everywhere: checking cat traps, at the vet, chasing dogs or passing out dog food samples to the homeless, she's a Dynamo! Tanya's hobbies include classic car restoration, car shows and home improvement projects. Tanya is married, has two children and her fur-babies are Cash, an English bulldog and Minnie, a toy poodle, who occasionally accompanies Tanya on duty and at City animal events.

INTERVIEW QUESTIONS:

What inspired you to become an Animal Control Officer?

RH: As a kid, I witnessed my own dog being abused and the Animal Control didn't or couldn't respond. I wanted to see a change in the way things were done.

TS: Working as an RVT at a shelter, I had seen a lot of animal neglect first-hand and wanted to stop it.

What is the most rewarding part of your job?

RH: Helping people become responsible for their pets and being able to provide justice for the mute animal. TS: Reducing the number of animals going to the shelter whenever possible! It's a good day if I don't have to go to the shelter!

What are your biggest challenges with Animal Services in Citrus Heights?

- RH: Being able to respond to calls as quickly as I would like to.
- TS: I would like to be able to help everybody! I work 10 hour shifts & there still isn't enough time.

If you could share one thing with Citrus Heights pet owners, what would it be?

RH: Animals would be truly happier & healthier if they were accepted completely as family members, and if anyone talks bad about the 49er's ... I'll tackle 'em... (Just kidding)!

TS: Spay and neuter your pets! Microchip and keep it updated, so I can bring your animals home.

If you were an animal, what would it be?

RH: Raptors, particularly the harpy eagle ... google it, it's huge!

TS: A cat or a bird, because I like to come and go as I please.

Who was your favorite 1980's musician/band?

RH: Michael Jackson. I begged my parents for a red leather jacket! There's a video of me moonwalking somewhere.... TS: Michael Jackson...ME TOO! I remember having posters everywhere as a kid and watching Thriller on MTV!

<u>**Car Travel**</u> Do Your Homework! For family vacations, visit websites like <u>DogGoes.com</u> or <u>DogFriendly.com</u> for ideas of pet friendly locations includes hotels, restaurants & parks. Unless it's absolutely necessary to take your dog to a veterinary or grooming appointment, the dog park, training, etc., its best to leave your pet home especially when running to the store or out to eat.

1. <u>NEVER LEAVE AN ANIMAL OR A CHILD IN A</u>

PARKED CAR, even if it's in the shade with the windows cracked or rolled down. Temperatures climb as soon as you close the car door. Several studies have been done that recorded the temperature increases the greatest in the first five minutes,

so even a 'quick trip' to the store can be dangerous to a pet or child. Cited studies include the Animal Protection Institute, Stanford University, San Francisco University, Louisiana State Medical Society and the 2009 RACQ Vehicle Technologies report Temperatures in Cars.

- 2. Visit <u>MyDogIsCool.com</u> to read the article How Hot Do Cars Get? API comparison tables of the enclosed car and the windows cracked car hardly differ.
- 3. Dogs left in the beds of pickup trucks fare no better. The metal surfaces of the truck bed or even the truck bed liner (usually black) are hot enough to burn the dog's feet and cause heat related illnesses.
- 4. When traveling alone, if you leave your pet in the car unattended and have a personal medical emergency while away from the vehicle, it could be days or even weeks before someone realizes your pet is there and needs help.
- 5. Many states now include animals left in a hot car under Animal Endangerment statutes or laws, such as California Penal Code. Part 1. Of Crimes and Punishments. Title 14. Malicious Mischief. § 597.7. Animal endangerment; confinement in unattended motor vehicle; violations and penalties provides that no person shall leave or confine an animal in any unattended motor vehicle under conditions that endanger the health or well-being of an animal due to heat, cold, lack of adequate ventilation, or lack of food or water, or other circumstances that could reasonably be expected to cause suffering, disability, or death to the animal. If the animal suffers great bodily injury, a violation of this section is punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500, imprisonment in a county jail not exceeding six months, or by both a fine & imprisonment.



Catalytic Converter Thefts on the Rise!

It has come to our attention that catalytic converter thefts are once again on the rise in our city. Catalytic converters are devices attached to the undercarriage of vehicles and are part of the exhaust system of vehicles. These devices contain precious metals which are used to convert harmful pollutants into less harmful emissions from your vehicles. Criminals steal catalytic converters because of the precious metals they contain.



Attached is a map which shows the general locations of all the catalytic converter thefts that were reported since April 1, 2014. To repair the damage done to a vehicle after a catalytic converter theft can be time consuming and costly.

Some things you should know about this crime in Citrus Heights:

- The vehicles being targeted -Primarily Toyota pickup trucks and SUV's because they sit higher and are easier for thieves to crawl under the vehicle in order to take this vehicle part.
- The method catalytic converter thieves are using Cutting the catalytic converter out of the vehicle with a saw or other pipe cutting tool.
- The time and locations being targeted These are all occurring in residential neighborhoods in the early morning hours throughout the week.

These are crimes of opportunity and there are several steps you can take to prevent from becoming a victim of this crime:

- Secure your vehicle -Park your vehicle in the garage especially if you own a Toyota pickup or SUV.
- Locking devices -Some automotive shops have special locking systems they can put around the catalytic converter to make it extremely difficult to take. One method is to weld rebar around the catalytic converter to lock it into place. There is also an anti-theft device called a Cat Clamp that you can purchase and have installed in the vehicle which also locks the catalytic converter into place using steel cables.
- Observe and report Watch out for your neighbors, report suspicious vehicles or people. If you see anyone under a Toyota pickup, SUV, or any vehicle that appears suspicious in nature, notify the Citrus Heights PD immediately.
- Park in well-lit areas –If you cannot park in the garage, please make sure you park in a well-lit area or use motion sensor
- Engrave a number -Such as a driver license number on this part is helpful because if your catalytic converter is stolen, you can tell the police the number you engraved and they can enter this vehicle part into a system as stolen. Automotive repair shops can also engrave a number on the catalytic converter for you.
- Spread the word Talk to your neighbors about the up rise in catalytic converter thefts and tell them what they can do to take preventative measures.

VoIP and 9-1-1 Emergency Calls

With the economy still recovering, many of us are trying to pinch pennies where we can. More citizens are switching their traditional "hard-line" phones for internet based phones, named VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) phones which can cost considerably less, but may change how a VoIP 9-1-1 emergency phone call is routed. We believe that public education about how VoIP works when trying to reach emergency services is essential.

We call the traditional phones that plug into a phone jack a "hard-line" because there is actually a line of copper wiring that runs from your house and under the ground to a switch box operated by your provider. When you call "9-1-1" your call is routed to the nearest Emergency Dispatch Center where our Enhanced 911 database tells us the location of where you are calling from.

VoIP is marketed under many names and by several companies. Vonage was an early adopter and is still a very popular service. Comcast cable offers "Bundle Packages" where they include the cost of internet, cable TV, and your phone line (which is actually VoIP and not a hard-line) for one low monthly price. Magic Jack is sold on late night infomercials to people who want to make long distance or international calls very inexpensively. All these things are well and good for the pocketbook.

The danger, however, lies in the responsibility that falls in the consumer's lap as far as emergency calls go. If you call 9-1-1 on one of these phones, your call will be routed to the closest emergency dispatch center from your billing address. Please note the term *Billing Address*, not necessarily where you are when you make the call.

In the case of Magic Jack, when you download the software you fill out a form stating where you want the base address to be. If your phone line is connected through your laptop, you could put your home address in as a base address, but then travel for business to Chicago. When you make a 9-1-1 call from that laptop, you would still get the Dispatch center for your home address thousands of miles away. To greatly reduce concerns associated with emergency call routing, we recommend you follow these five steps:

- 1. When your VoIP service is set up, provide your accurate physical address to your provider. After your service is set up, call your local Dispatch center on the non emergency line and ask them if it is a good time to test out your VoIP phone and see if it connects correctly. If the dispatcher says it is okay, call "9-1-1" from your VoIP phone and ask the dispatcher to confirm the information that appears on their Automatic Location Index screen and make sure it matches where you are.
- 2. Above all else **If you move, change your billing address *immediately*. ** You never know if the very first phone call you ever have to make from your new home might be for help.
- 3. If your power goes out, or your internet connection goes down, be aware that your VoIP service may not work. Consider installing a backup power supply, or having a traditional phone line with a phone handset to plug into the wall. (Even if you do not pay for a phone service to your home, as long as you had traditional phone service at some point, you can plug in a handset and call 9-1-1). Some people keep a handset phone plugged into a wall jack for this purpose alone. Take a moment to test this and see if it works from your home.
- 4. Ensure that your children, babysitters, and visitors in your home know about your VoIP service and its 9-1-1 limitations, if any.
- 5. If you have any additional questions about whether your phone service is interconnected and how it is routed, contact your service provider.



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Citrus Heights Police Department - B.A.T. Program

Is your vehicle safe while you sleep? On average in the United States, a vehicle is stolen every 21 minutes. Auto theft costs both the victims, insurance companies, and society since stolen vehicles are often used to commit other crimes. The majority of stolen vehicles occur during the hours of 1:00am to



5:00am. Since most vehicles are stolen during the night hours, the chance of successful immediate recovery is minimized due to the fact that the owner does not recognize the missing vehicle until the morning hours, thus giving criminals a head start.

The Citrus Heights Police Department developed a proactive approach to this issue, the Battle Auto Theft Program, or the B.A.T. program. The B.A.T. program is designed for residents that are unlikely to be using their vehicles between the hours of 1am and 5am. It is a free program that allows the residents of Citrus Heights to enroll their vehicle into the Citrus Heights Police Department database. The vehicle owner is then issued a serialized decal. The decal is affixed on the outside left- bottom corner of the rear window of the vehicle. The decal itself is a small, 3 by 5 inch sticker, with the B.A.T. logo. It is non-intrusive and will not interfere with driving or observing the road. The decal is a sign to any Citrus Heights Police Department Officer that the owner is authorizing them to stop the vehicle between the hours of 1am and 5am, if it is seen driving on the roadway. When the vehicle is stopped during these hours, the officer makes an effort to determine if the owner or another authorized individual is driving, or if the vehicle is in fact stolen. Often times, it is the fastest and most effective way to apprehend a vehicle thief and recover the vehicle.

Make it harder for criminals to get away with stealing your vehicle, participate in the B.A.T. program! To participate in this program, your vehicle or trailer must be registered in Citrus Heights and unlikely to be driven between the hours of 1am and 5am. Registration is fast and easy. Contact the Citrus Heights Police Department, located at 6315 Fountain Square Drive, and request a B.A.T. application form. The hours of operation for the Citrus Heights Police Department are Monday through Friday, 8am to 5pm, and Saturday, 9am to 2pm. You can also download the form online by visiting our website www.citrusheightspd.net . After filing out the form, bring it in to the Citrus Heights Police Department to be issued a serialized decal which will be affixed to your vehicle rear window by our personnel. Partnering with the Citrus Heights Police Department by enrolling in this free program will help us catch auto thieves in the act and lower your risk of becoming a victim of auto theft. Staff is still available to meet one-on-one with property or business owners at their convenience. In addition, the weekly Project Progress meetings have been changed to every other week. New sidewalks in the last stage, west-side from Indian Motor (just north of Pratt Avenue) to Kanai Avenue, are being constructed. Once all new sidewalks, driveways and curb and gutters have been formed and poured, the contractor will switch to working on the new medians and repaying the street.
Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS)	Work on Antelope & Kanai is scheduled for the next three weeks, new signal poles and trenching for conduits being the main part of the work. The traffic movement at the intersection will get worse when the pavement trenching is being accomplished, but new detection for vehicles and bicycles will be part of the new work. In other areas of the City (mainly the Auburn corridor from Van Maren to Sylvan Road) equipment failures have slowed the connection and interconnection for these intersections. This means signalized intersections will continue to oper- ate in the same manner for now. Programming to synchronize this corridor will wait for new communications im- provements.
Area 5 Traffic Safety, Accessibility and Walkability Phase 1B Project	On April 24th, the City Council awarded the construction contract to Central Valley Engineering and Asphalt (CVE). CVE is set to begin construction in mid-May 2014.
Sunrise/Sungarden Intersection Safety Improvement Project	Staff is submitting the Request for Authorization (RFA) to construct to Caltrans in mid-May and anticipates advertising for construction bids in late June (pending Caltrans approval of the RFA).
Sunrise Blvd Complete Streets Improve- ments - Phase 3 (Antelope Road to north City Limits - west side only)	The Right-of-Way acquisition process continues. The design consultant is finalizing the 90% plan and estimate package for submittal to the City in May.
Areas 8, 9 & 10 Drainage Master Plan Study	This project is ready for presentation to Areas 8, 9 and 10 residents for a final review. The input from residents at this meeting will be incorporated into the final document.
Auburn Phase II (Rusch Park to the Northern City Limits)	The City has received a \$4 million grant to complete the preliminary engineering, environmental recertification and Right of Way acquisition. Staff will be submitting a request for authorization through Caltrans to begin the process. We anticipate finalizing the consultant selection process in the Fall.
2014 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Staff completed field reviews and 65% plans and estimates in April. The utility notification "B" Letters will be issued in May. Staff expects to advertise for bids in June and begin construction in July.
Antelope Road Safe Route to School Project	Staff is currently reviewing the 65% plans and specification package and will provide comments back to the consultant in late May.
Sunrise Blvd Bus Stop Improvements Project, Phase 2	Construction began the week of May 12th, with Location #2 (Sunrise Blvd & Uplands Way).
Twin Oaks and Mariposa Diversion Pipe (Area 6&7 Master Plan Implementation)	Staff and environmental consultants met with the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Army Corps of Engineers on April 30th. The Department of Fish and Wildlife determined that no environmental document would be needed for this project. Plans are now 35% complete and ready for presentation at the Neighborhood Area 6 regular meeting at the end of May.
City Hall Green Parking Lot	The contractor is getting Livescans completed to clear all personnel to work on the project. If there are no delays, construction will begin on Monday, May 19th and the project will be completed by the beginning of September.
Oak Tree Preservation Work	Preservation work continues on the Old Auburn Corridor as well as on Sylvan and Van Maren. We will wrap up this work by the first of June. Many of the trees receiving cleanup are Heritage Oaks well over 150 years old.


Sylvan Community Center






