Safety Tips for Your Children

Parents:



- Talk to your children about strangers and the importance of knowing who will be picking them up after school.
- If your children are walking, try to have them walk with a friend and pick a safe route with high visibility.
- When picking your children up from school, stop and park in designated areas. Please respect neighbors who live near the campus.
- Make sure your child's school has the most updated emergency contact information for you.
- If your child is walking or biking to and from school, please talk to them about the importance of being aware of what is going on around them.
- Write down the make, model, and serial numbers to valued property your child takes with them to school (ie. iPod, cell phone, or bicycle). Store this information in a safe place in your home. This information will be useful in recovering your child's property if stolen or lost.

Bicycle Laws:

- Explain bicycle laws to your children.
- Anyone under the age of 18 must wear a helmet when riding bicycle.
- If your children do not have access to a bicycle lane or you have a safety concern about them riding in the bike lane, it is legal for bicyclists to ride on the sidewalk in the City of Citrus Heights. Keep in mind that bicyclists must still ride in the same direction with traffic and pedestrians walking on the sidewalk have the right of way.

Kids:

- Try to avoid walking or biking anywhere alone.
- Remember, **everyone** under the age of 18 must wear a helmet if you are riding a bicycle, skateboarding, skating, or riding a scooter.
- When riding a bicycle, ride in the same direction as traffic in the bicycle lane.
- Do not talk to strangers.
- Never take a short cut through an area or neighborhood you are unfamiliar with.
- Never take a short cut through an area or neighborhood your parents have not told you to take.
- Don't ever listen to your iPod too loud-you need to hear what is going on around you.
- Try not to text and walk and the same time. Texting while walking is dangerous and keeps you from paying attention.

City Volunteers should be able to commit to one year, work 12 hours a week and pass a background check.

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Great Tips from a Great City - It's Summer Time

Do you want to lower your SMUD bills? Did you know that during our hot Sacramento summers, cooling puts a heavy demand on power supplies and increase your SMUD Bill? Here are some tips to stay cool and save money this summer:

- •Plant a FREE Tree on the sunny side of your home. SMUD's Shade Tree program offers free shade trees for customers whose homes have an eastern, western or southern exposure that heats up during the summer.
- •Set the thermostat at 78 degrees or higher. You'll gain savings of about 5 to 10 percent on the operating cost of an air conditioner for every two degrees of cooling you're willing to give up.
- •Change the filter regularly. An air conditioning unit with dirty filters can use 5 to 10 percent more energy.
- •Use fans instead of the central air conditioning unit whenever possible. Individual fans cost about 90 percent less to operate.
- •Lay off appliances during hot afternoons and evenings. Many appliances create heat and moisture, making the air conditioner work harder. Limit use of ranges and stoves, dishwashers, dryers, washing machines, and other heat-producing equipment to early morning or late evening when temperatures are cooler.
- •Prepare cold meals such as salads and sandwiches. Cook hot meals only late in the evening, when it's cooler.
- •If you have a refrigerator or freezer in your garage that isn't full, consider getting rid of it. These appliances tend to be older and hog energy.

SacramentoGO - Outreach Program

Do you want light rail services expanded, bus services improved, potholes fixed, traffic signals synchronized, or new bridges or roadways built?

Through its <u>SacramentoGO</u> outreach program, the Sacramento Transportation Authority (STA) – which manages the current Sacramento County Measure A half-cent sales tax for transportation – is looking for public input to help determine future countywide transportation priorities.

Through the current Measure A sales tax, you already have helped deliver critical improvements to the region's transportation system, including Sacramento Regional Transit light rail extensions, bus and carpool lanes on I-80 and Highway 50, Paratransit service expansions, Folsom Lake and Lake Natoma crossings, and much more.

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Citrus Heights Green Parking Lot Demonstration & Monitoring Project

Construction of a new Green Parking Lot is currently underway at the Citrus Heights Police Department (6315 Fountain Square Drive). Crews have graded the north site and installed curbs, gutters, and drainage infrastructure. Over the next two weeks, contractors will pave portions of the lot; install temporary irrigation; and plant native drought-tolerant plants.

The purpose of the Green Parking Lot Project is to retrofit an existing storage area and parking lot with low-impact development (LID) features such as pervious pavement and bioswales. In addition, the City will monitor water-quality before, during, and after implementation of the LID features as part of the Green Parking Lot Project. The City expect construction to be complete by mid-September.

Funded in part by Proposition 84, the project is an innovative approach to stormwater management. The City brought stormwater services in-house in 2010 and has been working to improve the city's drainage infrastructure to protect a valuable resource – water. Apps for Safety

Welcome to 2014! In this day and age, we have a vast amount of technology that aids us in our daily activities. We have cars that run on electricity, and homes equipped with thermostats and appliances that can be manipulated by computer or smart phone while we are miles away.

Smart phones are becoming more ubiquitous with the latest census data showing 145 million people in the Unites States using a smart phone, and that number is projected to be 270 million by 2020. I have previously written about how dialing 9-1-1 from a cell phone differs from a landline phone, but even more changes are on the horizon.

The demand for texting 9-1-1 is growing and the four major US carriers (Verizon, T-Mobile, AT&T, and Sprint) have all stated that they would have their technology in place by May of this year. However, just because the companies have the technology, does not mean that your local dispatch center is going to be equipped to receive those texts, as of this writing only one county in Northern California has the technology to accept these calls, and they are in a testing phase. What can you do until then if you need help but genuinely cannot call 9-1-1?

There are several new Apps available for smartphones that are designed to keep you and your loved ones safe. Here are links to four of the many available, they are all free to download (some have monthly activation charges) and may just give you help during a time of need.

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Animal Services Division-Pets Need Crisis Care too

Most of us carry some kind of health insurance for our families by now, thanks to the government mandate, but sometimes we forget or neglect to plan ahead for our furry family members. Our pets can benefit from preventive health care, and companion animals suffer sudden illness or injury just as we can. Fortunately, there are some growing options for pet wellness and emergency care. To help a neighbor, a friend, or family member find veterinary financial assistance, the internet is a great place to start, with a wide selection of frequently updated information.

INSURANCE

Among the recent studies on how American families have increased spending on their pets, pet insurance, once a rarity, has become a regular expenditure. A recent review of pet insurance providers was done by www.TopConsumerReviews.com and can be useful in determining the types of coverage that can be purchased and the return on the dollar (or should I say collar). http://www.topconsumerreviews.com/pet-insurance/

FINANCING

Veterinarians have also felt the need to offer options to their clients and pet families when it comes to critical care. While the vet or his practice may not be able to financially carry debt for a client, they sometimes offer financing services through another company. Banks such as Wells Fargo and CareCredit now offer credit cards or loans to finance expensive veterinary procedures. Ask your vet if they offer this option or if they would consider offering it in the future.

NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

Understanding there are some households where pet care may not be financially possible, some non-profit agencies have programs for free or low cost vaccines and spay-neuter programs, and they may also have individual grants or payment awards for life-saving veterinary care. Some grants are breed or illness based (cancer, diabetes, hip dysplasia, etc.), or urgency based (hit by car/accident, house fire, etc.) and others are based upon the individual's ability to pay (low income, seniors on fixed income, etc.). The Chester Foundation, RedRover Relief, the ASPCA and Humane Society can be great resources for unexpected and emergency vet expenses.

Construction Projects



Project	Status
Sylvan Road/Stock Ranch Road Inter- section Improvements Project	Staff is finalizing the environmental review and acquisition of one small parcel for the project, both expected to be complete by late July. The project team anticipates advertising for construction bids in August.
Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS)	Lanes are open, but construction of ADA ramps and signal head programming is still being accomplished.
Area 5 Traffic Safety, Accessibility and Walkability Phase 1B Project	Work is progressing and Central Valley Engineering and Asphalt (CVE) completed the second and third locations in mid -July. Central Valley Engineering and Asphalt (CVE) expects to complete the project in late August.
Sunrise/Sungarden Intersection Safety Improvement Project	Staff anticipates receiving Federal authorization to construct by early August and will advertise for construction bids immediately.
Sunrise Blvd Complete Streets Improve- ments - Phase 3 (Antelope Road to north City Limits - west side only)	The right-of-way acquisition team has obtained signatures from nine of the twelve property owners and is working to get the final signatures. Staff expects to submit a Request for Authorization (RFA) to Construct to Caltrans in July with approval of the RFA anticipated in September. Construction is slated to start in Spring 2015.
Antelope Road Improvements	Traffic patterns are being monitored with the opening of the new Casino, nothing of significance has changed. The new lane alignments are now being utilized with a great improvement of traffic flow.
Sunrise Blvd Bus Stop Improvements Project, Phase 2	Construction on the bus stop at Location #2 (Sunrise Blvd & Uplands Way) continues. The concrete bus pad and turnout is completed and the contractor is currently working on the retaining walls behind the new sidewalk.
2014 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Staff advertised for bids on July 16th and anticipates a construction start in late August.
On-Call Tree Maintenance and Removal Services	Proposals were received on June 18th, and on July 10th, the City Council awarded a contract to West Coast Arborists, Inc. for on call tree maintenance and removal services for the term of 2014 to 2019. Staff will be coordinating the new contracts and works schedules within the coming weeks.
SRCC Creek Cleaning	Crews removed 8 yards of debris during the past two weeks on Old Auburn, Mariposa, Highland, Zeeland and Donald Drive.
Landscape Maintenance Services	An RFP was released on June 19th for annual maintenance services for all City landscaping areas, medians and districts. The mandatory pre-bid meeting was held on June 26th, and bids were due to the City Clerk on July 9th. Staff received two proposals for the City Wide Landscape Maintenance Services RFP. The low bidder was California Landscape and Associates. City Council awarded the 2014 to 2019 contract at the July 30th City Council Meeting.
City Hall Green Parking Lot	Concrete curbs and base rock will be placed in the new PD parking lot this week. The Keystone wall along the redwood trees is complete. Curbs in the new pervious paved lot are getting poured this week. Pavement of the new PD lot is schedule for next week. This project remains on schedule for a mid-September completion.
CalRecycle - Used Oil Block Grant	The annual regional education campaign is running from mid-June through August. The Regional Recycling Group, comprised of jurisdictions throughout northern California, pool recycle grant funds in order to fund the campaign, which has a website with the ads posted: http://www.recycleusedoil.com/ . The campaign features five TV spots focused on (1) the oil change interval no longer being 3000 miles and advising that the owner's manual be checked to see what frequency is really needed. The intent is to reduce the amount of oil in the environment; and (2) reminding people who change their own oil to recycle the oil and the filter. There are also radio ads that are broadcast throughout the campaign as well as a focus group that will be held in August. A final summary of the campaign will be available in September.


As of July 15, 2014, the center is at 4,347 events booked.




Sylvan Community Center





DOGGONE, IT'S SUMMER!

Please keep your pets safe this summer.

Dogs don't sweat like humans and can suffer HEATSTROKE far more easily.

Exercise your dog early or late in the day. All dogs, especially flat faced breeds can overheat quickly.



Provide fresh water daily. Clam shell pools and doggy ice treats/kongs/home alone toys are great fun, keeps them cool and provides mental enrichment.



Check the temperature of the ground or sand because if it's too hot to touch, then it's TOO HOT for their PAWS.



Leave dogs in a shady area, bearing in mind the movement of the sun as the day passes.



Never walk your dog when the temperature is over 30C (85F), their paws burn on hot pavement and hot sand.



Never leave your dog in a parked car on a warm day. Even on a cool day, the temperature in the car is much hotter than outside and can lead to brain damage or death!!



SIGNS OF HEATSTROKE

Muddy pink gums (instead of bright pink), heavy panting with occasional frothing at the mouth, disorientation, increased heart rate.

What To Do: Remove the pet from the heat source if possible. Increase ventilation (fan) and apply cool water or a cool towel compress. Do not apply ice, this causes the blood vessels to constrict and takes the dog longer to cool down. Reapply the cool towels frequently. Offer water to your pet, but don't force it.

Get your pet to the veterinarian quickly.
